### **Tasmanian Education and Community Buildings Nominated for Architecture Awards**

Tasmanian architects will this week learn the winners of the annual Tasmanian Architecture Awards. Among the entries this year are several important community and education buildings including Dock4 Architects' Clarence High School Sports Pavilion in Hobart, Edwards+Simpson's Break O'Day Community Stadium at St Helens, Circa and Morrison & Breytenbach's UTAS Inveresk Residences in Launceston and HBV's Trinity Hill Youth Accommodation & Training Facility in Hobart.

The President of the Tasmanian Chapter of the Australian Institute of Architects, Brad Wheeler, says this year's entries demonstrate the value architecture can bring to the community.

"Tasmanian architects have a fantastic record designing award-winning buildings and spaces that benefit our island state's communities, and this year is no exception. From student accommodation and facilities to sports pavilions and tourist attractions, architects have again helped to provide buildings and places that enrich all our lives and provide economic benefits for our state," said Mr Wheeler.

Architectural services in Australia is a \$6.4 billion industry, employing almost 14,000 people. According to a recent Board of Architects survey, 99% of Australians believe that it is important to invest in good design of hospitals and schools, and that cities and towns are better places to live when public buildings and spaces are well designed.

In recent years the Tasmanian community has been transformed with new education and community buildings. Tasmanian architects have designed and delivered award-winning community projects including Terroir Architects' Burnie's Makers' Workshop, Lyons Architects Medical Sciences buildings for the University of Tasmania in Hobart, Room 11's Glenorchy Art and Sculpture Park and Birelli Art + Architecture + Design's Bicheno Surf Life Saving Club. Under the Building Education Revolution Scheme, Tasmanian architects also built many new school buildings, trade training centres and child and family centres.

The annual architecture awards program recognises the finest accomplishments of Tasmanian architects, with projects ranging from innovative residential buildings through to sports and community projects and high-profile tourist facilities.
