

Be Humble, Make Models!

In Tokyo, the significance of model making is unparalleled. Everywhere we went, the meticulous creation of both small and large models was evident, serving not just as visual aids but as essential tools for iterative design and problem-solving. This hands-on approach not only ensures that every detail is considered and refined before construction begins, it creates a culture of understanding spatial planning and design and the result of design decision. Also, the culture emphasis on humility, profoundly influences architectural practice there. Architects are encouraged to stay grounded, constantly learning and remaining connected to their communities. This ethos was epitomised by master Riken Yamamoto, who stressed that an understanding of users is necessary when engaged as an architect and that's only possible through staying local. This would result in high level of community engagement where architects here deeply understand their communities and design with their needs in mind, ensuring that their projects are contextually relevant and socially beneficial. Japan's approach to affordable building was also a unique strategy. Being revolved around mastering both design and construction, architects can create cost-effective solutions without compromising on quality. The practice of subdividing spaces into functional, efficient units was prevalent, demonstrating a keen understanding of space. Prefabrication techniques were also a common theme, highlighting a commitment to reducing waste and increasing efficiency.











Apart from the remarkable story of the division and rebound, Berlin showcased a relentless pursuit of design excellence and innovation. The city's architectural community operates under the mantra of designing until there's no time left, pushing creative boundaries and refining ideas to the utmost limit. This dedication to perfection is paired with a profound understanding of manufacturing processes, ensuring that designs are not only innovative but also practical and buildable. Driven by the city planning typology of mix use, multifunctional spaces that seamlessly integrate work and living environments are a testament to this holistic approach. Berlin's architects pay meticulous attention to the properties and potential of different materials, recognising that materiality is crucial to the success of their designs. Prefabrication is widely adopted here, facilitating efficient construction and enabling architects to experiment with novel forms and structures, while leading many sustainability agenda in all aspects.

A highlight of the visit was exploring projects by Mies van der Rohe, which underscored the importance of learning from architectural masters. These iconic buildings are not just historical landmarks but also valuable educational tools that continue to inspire contemporary practice. Berlin taught me the value of pushing creative limits while maintaining a strong grasp on the practical aspects of construction, blending innovation with feasibility.



Valladolid

Embracing Community with Thoughtful Design!

Leaving behind the bustling streets of Madrid, our journey to Valladolid took us through the serene agricultural plains of northwest Madrid. Our exploration of Valladolid included visits to four notable projects by Óscar Miguel Ares of Contextos de Arquitectura y Urbanismo, who masterfully integrates community needs with architectural design. The building's local limestone, recycled from demolished structures, contributes to a circular economy, reflecting a thoughtful approach to materiality and sustainability.

In some other projects, he integrates prefabricated beams with local sandstone, creating a space where light, shadow, and texture interact harmoniously. Óscar's work stands as a testament to the power of architecture to enhance community life through thoughtful and context-aware design.

This approach also replicated in the work of Estudio Primitivo Gonzalez with deep understanding of their city as well as understanding how architectural design can elevate community experiences while making the most of available resources.

Overall, the design of regional architecture of this part of Spain, seemed to emphasis on functionality , celebration of local material and simplicity, ensuring that the buildings serve multiple purposes and enrich the lives of those who use them.

- Art and AI: Use them together rather than seeing AI as a threat.
- Sustainability: Emphasise recycling and creating environments for nature.
- Precision: Aim to get it right the first time.
- Research & Understanding: Fundamental to successful architecture.
- Cultural Sensitivity: Understand and integrate into the local culture.
- Radical Thinking: Be bold and question everything.
- Learning from Masters: Appreciate and study the greats like Mies van der Rohe.
