Statement of Significance

A strong, confident architectural composition with well proportioned elements, restrained detailing and limited range of materials - brick, concrete and glass - which are followed through to the interior spaces. The central atrium space, rising through the full height of the building, provides a generous arrival point, a clear statement of the circulation system, and a well lit, inviting and pleasant space for occupants.

Description

A three storey building constructed of red brick and in-situ concrete consisting of a central entry and vertical circulation space; unequal side wings with a strong horizontal banded composition of continuous glazing, brick (ground floor) and concrete (upper floors) spandrels and fascias. The generous internal atrium space contains common room facilities at ground level; stepped ramps to upper levels with bridge connections to wings containing laboratories and offices with saw tooth south light roof glazing over the whole area. Foundation stone laid by Rt. Hon. Nigel Bowen, Minister for Education and Science, 14 November 1970; and opened by the Governor General Sir Paul Hasluck, 10 November 1977.

Condition and Integrity

Good. The Robertson Lecture Theatre built in 1992 is well integrated with the building.

Background/History

Analysis against the Criteria specified in Schedule 2 of the Land (Planning and Environment) Act 1991
